## Mt. Sengan

Nationally designated as [Height:162 m] Cultural Property & Scenic Beauty

To be full of the joys of spring, Mt. Sengan is a famous place for cherry blossoms.

Mt. Sengan was named for its scenery of oddly shaped rocks. This mountain used to be called "Mt. Tejakushi" (literally, "pour your own drink") after a legend that Amakusa Shiro, the leader of the Shimabara Amakusa Revolt(1637), drank sake in advance with his followers before they left for the battle.

The lookout on the top of Mt. Sengan, offers a magnificent panoramic view of the Amakusa Go-kyo (Amakusa's Five Bridges) which connects the islands, as well as the Uto Peninsula, Shimabara Peninsula, Amakusa Shimoshima, and the Yatsushiro Sea.
